Week 1	Surah 105 Al-Fi	The historical event of Abraha trying to destroy the Kaaba and God protecting His house from being raised. As a result, Quraysh is viewed by other Arabs as a tribe in special favour with God.
Week 2	Surah 106 Quraysh	God reminds Quraysh that their wealth was by God showing them the trade routes to the south and north.
Week 3	Surah 107. Al-Ma'un	Highlights qualities manifested by disbelievers and hypocrites.
Week 4	Surah 108 Al-Kawthar	Allah's immense bounty bestowed upon His noble Messenger in favoring and showering him with worldly and eternal blessings.
Week 5	Surah 109 Al-Kafirun 110 Al-Nasr 111. Al-Masad	Unicity of God and Him being free from associates. The polytheist is seeking a truce with the Prophet in that he stops delivering the message The Prophesising of the liberating of Makkah. The spreading of Islam over the Arabia peninsula and the cessation of idol worship by accepting Islam. Mentions two vehement antagonists towards the message and the Prophet, Abū Lahab and his wife, Umm Jamīl, by foretelling their deaths will be as disbelievers and, in Umm Jamīl's case, how she shall die.
Week 6	Surah 112. Al-Ikhlās	Establishes the keystone attributes of God's oneness and omnipotence and all of the creations' reliance upon Him.
Week 7	Surah 113. Al-Falaq	Seeking refuge in the sanctuary of the AllMerciful from the evil of creation and anxieties.
Week 8	Surah 114. Al-Nas	Seeking refuge with the Lord of the worlds from the devil and his aides amongst people and demons.
Week 9	Surah 1. Al-'Fatiha	Many scholars regard it as the most important surah of the Quran for synthesising its message, hence being called 'Umm al-Kitab Mother of the Book.
